

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ABOUT MAYWORKS

OUR VISION

The vision of the Mayworks Festival of Working People and the Arts is to incite the creation and production of art that engages diverse artists and workers at the intersection of culture, economics and social justice.

OUR MISSION

Mayworks showcases working people's art, and promotes artists-as-workers and workers-as-artists. We operate within an anti-oppressive framework that prioritizes the representation and participation of artists and audiences from equity-seeking groups.

OUR MANDATE

Mayworks curates and presents artistically compelling projects through an annual multidisciplinary arts festival. Our programming reflects the reality of working people's lives and supports the struggles for better living and working conditions.

We work with a diverse community of activists, artists and workers who engage in creative and bold critical responses to pressing issues at the intersection of art, social justice and labour.

Mayworks cultivates meaningful relationships with communities that face systemic discrimination and injustice. We prioritize the representation and participation of Indigenous people, Black people, people of colour, LGBTQ2 people, people with disabilities, women and young people in our programming.

LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

As we gather together, we acknowledge this sacred land on which this Mayworks activity is located. It has been a site of human activity for 15,000 years. This land is the territory of the Huron-Wendat and Petun First Nations, the Seneca and most recently, the Mississaugas of the Credit River. We also honour and respect the Metis peoples, who are our neighbours.

The territory is the subject of the Dish With One Spoon Wampum Belt Covenant, an agreement between the Iroquois Confederacy and the Confederacy of the Ojibwe and allied nations to peaceably share and care for the resources around the Great Lakes.

Today, the meeting place of Toronto is still the home to many Indigenous people from across Turtle Island and we are grateful to have the opportunity to live and work on this territory.

We are also mindful of broken covenants and the need to strive to make right with all our relations.

We are grateful to have the opportunity to live and work on this land, and will work to honour the treaties of this territory, while committing ourselves to the struggle of decolonization. We recognize that the nature and work of combatting gendered violence is rooted in the ongoing colonization of this land, and will continue to work to center and support Indigenous peoples and communities to the best of our abilities.

This land acknowledgement does not exist in a past tense. Colonization is ongoing, and we need to work to understand, recognize, and challenge our participation within colonization, as individuals, as an arts organization, and as a community.

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





THE MAYWORKS LABOUR ARTS AWARDS have been recognizing significant contributions to the arts and labour movements since 2013.

ARTIST AWARD

For Excellence in Contribution to Labour and Social Justice Movement

For an artist who has significantly captured the values of the labour and social justice movements in their art.

Award recipient: TZAZNÁ MIRANDA LEAL



Tzazná Miranda Leal is a queer, mixed indigenous and spanish migrant from Mexico who has spent the last 12 years organizing for migrant justice, workers' rights, indigenous sovereignty and anti-racist struggles with a community feminist lens. Tzazná organizes with Justice for Migrant Workers and was the campaign coordinator for Harvesting Freedom as well as both Pilgrimage to Freedom campaigns that occurred in 2010 and 2011. Tzazná is currently enrolled in the Masters of Environmental Studies at York University. Tzazná has also worked as an organizer in the labour movement, has been a community legal worker in the legal clinic system and has organized with numerous migrant justice organizations. Tzazna is a visual artist and illustrator. Her work has been featured at the Mayworks Arts Festival, the Margins of Eras and accompanied the Harvesting Freedom campaign across over 22 cities across Ontario. Miranda Leal is currently working on a illustrated radical history of the migrant farm worker movement whose objective to celebrate migrant farmworker organizing as well as to document our own communities' resistance and history.

LABOUR ORGANIZATION

For Excellence in Contribution to Labour Arts For a labour organization which has made outstanding use of the arts to engage their membership.

Award recipient: **OPSEU CAAT ACADEMIC DIVISION**



Faculty at Ontario's Colleges of Applied Arts and Technology include more than 12,000 professors, instructors, librarians and counsellors at publicly-funded colleges across Ontario. Represented by the Ontario Public Service Employees Union (OPSEU), College Faculty led a historic five-week strike in 2017 notable for its creative use of the arts. The highly publicized negotiations and strike action raised the bar in post-secondary education on issues of contract work, academic freedom, and equal pay for equal work.

LABOUR CREATIVE MAVERICK

For an unusual and creative use of the arts to promote labour rights and awareness

Award recipient: USW "YETI ON STRIKE"

ANONYMOUS OPSEU MEMBER



Yeti is understood to be a part-time college faculty member at a GTA public college. As a vulnerable precarious worker, Yeti has chosen to protect their employment by concealing their identity. In a brave and creative move, the faculty member known as Yeti chose to wear a costume in order to safely support the picket line. Well-known for their camera-friendly costume, Yeti was frequently photographed and video-taped dancing and chanting slogans on picket lines during the five-week college faculty strike in 2017.

TRADITIONAL LABOUR ARTS

For the creative design of a quilt or a banner to promote labour solidarity

Award recipient: USW DISTRICT 6
WOMEN'S COMMITTEE



Since 1987, the United Steelworkers District 6 Women's Committee has worked to advance women's equality inside and outside the union. USW District 6 covers Ontario and the Atlantic provinces and is the birthplace of the union's "Women of Steel" program. To mark its 30th anniversary in 2017, the committee organized a major conference, bringing women workers together to celebrate, learn, and plan to address the challenges women continue to face on the road to full equality. The committee also sponsored the creation of a commemorative quilt. Women from across the district responded, making blocks that spoke to their individual creativity, to their work on committees and inside locals, and to their cultural and geographic identities.

THE MIN SOOK LEE AWARD

For an individual who has captured the values of the labour and social justice movements in their art or through their activism over many years

This award is named in honour of Min Sook Lee, an activist-artist whose own contributions moved Mayworks Festival toward its current artistic vision to actively seek representation of equity groups as audiences and artists. Lee also helped Mayworks focus on programming that engages new, non-arts audiences, and that challenges Euro-centric notions of art.

Award recipient: **D'ARCY MARTIN**



D'Arcy has organized, designed and facilitated courses with workers in every Canadian province. He has educated as staff or contract worker in a dozen unions. Beginning with the "Standing Up" visual series developed by Karl Beveridge and Carole Conde in 1979, D'Arcy has integrated the arts into one learning project after another. He was part of an intensely committed group that generated the Mayworks Festival in 1986 and the Workers Arts and Heritage Centre shortly after, as well as arts committees in central labour bodies across the country. He remains an informal "connector" of union activists to all of these initiatives, helping artists to earn a living wage and workers to occupy creative space.

JURY MEMBERS

PRAMILA AGGARWAL is an award-winning community activist and for 20 years was a Professor in the Community Worker Program at George Brown College. She is currently doing research on the contribution of Punjabi grandmothers to Canadian society and a Visiting Professor at the International Institute of Adult and Lifelong Education, Delhi, India.

PAMELA ARANCIBIA is a PhD candidate at the University of Toronto, where she is studying the relationship between text and image in Early Modern Italian Bibles. She is also a labour activist and former Chair of CUPE 3902, which represents contract academic workers at the University of Toronto. Pamela is currently a board member of the Mayworks Festival of Working People and the Arts, where she is able to bring together her love of art and commitment to the labour movement.

WALLY BROOKER is a jazz saxophonist, journalist, cultural activist, and long-time secretary of the United May Day Committee. His monthly column, "Music Notes", has been appearing in People's Voice newspaper (peoplesvoice.ca) for the past eight years. Wally is a member of the Toronto Musicians Association (AFM Local 149).

FRANK SAPTEL is the national communications trainer with the International Association of Machinists and Aerospace Workers (IAMAW) in Canada Frank is involved in trade union activism, as well as human rights and social justice. He is also a Board member of the Our Times Magazine and is the founder of CLiFF. Frank has also published 3 books of poetry.













ARTIST TALK



Ben McCarthy is a sound and installation artist, among other things. Working alongside visual artist and game designer **Jonathan Carroll** (of performance art collective Tough Guy Mountain), they bring together sound design and virtual reality to document the self-narrated stories of workers directly impacted by the policies and budget cuts undermining the most marginalized among us, including social workers, nurses, sex workers, temporary foreign workers, and hotel workers.

In the VR helmet, a user will see a number of human figures circulating, and hear a sound track of disparate voices and musical texture. Ambiently hovering over a form will invite the subject to step forward, accompanied by her chosen objects, and to deliver elements of her interview. The 3D-scanned body will be expressionistically animated to develop elements of the interview and the sound design. The work raises questions about how we know and access the working subject in the context of an encompassing capitalist technological ecosystem.

Justseeds Artists' Cooperative is a decentralized, worker-owned cooperative of thirty printmaking artists throughout Turtle Island. Grounded in the transformative power of personal expression in concert with collective action, Justseeds produces collective portfolios that contribute graphics to grassroots struggles for justice.

Last year, in collaboration with the new Poor People's Campaign in the U.S., Justseeds produced a print portfolio for the renewed call to end poverty. Since the original campaign organized by Martin Luther King, Jr. in 1967, there have been growing broad and deep social movements rooted in leadership of poor people and aimed to transform the global structures that engender the rotten fruits of poverty, inequality, and oppression.

Justseeds artists Jesse Purcell and Paul Kjelland will host an exhibit of the portfolio and a community open studio. Thinking about and using the images produced for the campaign, participants can learn screen printing basics and create prints on paper and fabric for the May Day march and other anti-poverty organizing in events and actions.

Mayworks is proud to partner with *The Public*, a studio that focuses on anti-oppression, sustainability, and social growth. *The Public* is an activist led space whose work is aimed at being uplifting in a variety of contexts. *The Public* often presents various workshops on a number of topics including textile production, anti-violence training, media training and consent workshops. *The Public* has a "do it yourself" attitude and brings together these efforts as much as possible to engage in social change.

In this three hour workshop, participants will be introduced to the practice of conditional design; an adaptive, game-based process of analogue visualization that uses input, logic and creativity to respond to environmental changes. Through discussions and small group activities, we will propose idealized and speculative conditions, resulting in new visualizations that imagine a just and equitable future for working peoples.

Conditional design is a concept for artists and designers that focuses on processes rather than products. The Conditional Design Manifesto focuses on the approach to design rather than the media we choose to use for our outputs and creations.

The workshop will be led by **Sheila Sampath**, the principal and creative director of *The Public*, as well as the Editor in Chief of *Shameless Magazine*, Canada's feminist voice for young women and trans youth. Sheila is an important part of Toronto's arts community, providing spaces for unique and engaging works.

ART EXHIBITION



Kara Manso is a temporary worker turned migrant activist turned contemporary artist. The work of the caregiver-as-artist takes its source material from her own experience both as a migrant worker and a migrant activist. Her preoccupation with the "robots" highlights the irony of care workers being treated without feelings within dehumanizing migrant work programs. Last year, when Manso first applied to be part of Mayworks, she used a pseudonym to avoid persecution by her employers. We also exhibited the robot head masks she had created to protect herself and other caregivers during demonstrations for decent work.



As part of these efforts, the Mayworks Festival stands as a commitment to Labour and the Arts, and labour arts itself. *The May Day Gathering* is a celebration of labour arts and the work of the labour movement as a whole. We welcome everyone to join us for a free reception which includes exhibitions of *The Poor People's Campaign* and *Future is Caregiving*.





FILM SCREENING



The short films in this program weave together surreal landscapes, evocative meditations and luminescent cinema to bring on screen Indigenous people living, working and dreaming. The futurity in these works is deeply rooted in their connection to traditional knowledge, the land and community.



BLIGHT - Perun Bonser (12 min, 2017)

Set in the early 20th century on Australia's western frontier, a police constable hunts down a band of supposed criminals aided by a young, Indigenous female tracker. When the constable is severely injured, the tracker must use all of her skills to outwit and defeat seemingly unstoppable foe.

MY FATHER'S TOOLS (6 min, 2016)

Stephen goes about weaving a traditional basket with the knowledge his father gave him. As he weaves the basket, there is a sense of peace and connection to all his father taught him.

NUUCA - Michelle Latimer (12 min, 2017)

The oil boom in North Dakota has brought thousands of new people to the region and with them an influx of drugs, crime and sex trafficking. This beautiful work is an evocative meditation on Indigenous women's integral connection to land and the ways in which the extractive industry's rape of the Earth is directly linked to the violence perpetrated against Indigenous women and girls.

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
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
