#### Lillian Allen, Festival Coordinator


Lillian Allen is recognized as a major artistic figure on the Canadian culture scene. She is a writer and poet, and a birth mother of dub poetry. Often performing and lecturing internationally, Ms. Allen is the winner of two Juno awards for her recordings of

poetry with music: Revolutionary Tea Party (1986) and Conditions Critical (1988). Her work includes a recording for children and young people: Nothing But A Hero, and three books specially geared to young audiences: Why Me, Nothing But A Hero and If You See Truth.

Her second collection of poetry, Women Do This Every Day, was published in 1993 to critical acclaim. Ms. Allen's poetry has appeared in



A creative artist, Ms. Allen co-produced and codirected *Blak Wi Blakk*... a film on rastafarian, reggae, dub poet, Mutabaruka which premiered at the 1993 Toronto International Film Festival. Her fourth major recording project of poetry with music, *We Shall Take Our Freedom & Dance* is slated for a U.S. and Canadian release.
