

Not a Care... is a history of caring from early times up to the present health care crisis in Canada. In consultation with Service Employees International Union visual artists **Carole Condé** and **Karl Beveridge** have designed a series of eight photographic images depicting how people were cared for at various points in history and show a patient growing up from birth to old age. A care-giver is portrayed from each period along with the relevant medical technology and medicine and who, in each case, benefits from them. The series is based on discussions with health care workers and research on the history of public health care.

Breaking Ground is a 7' x 20' quilted mural that stands as a public memorial to the five Italian immigrant labourers who perished on March 17, 1960 while digging a watermain tunnel at Hogg's Hollow. This tragedy mobilized those involved in the building trades to form stronger unions, and to organize around key issues affecting workplace safety. This forced changes in health and safety regulations that are in effect today. Conceived and created by **Laurie Swim**, with volunteers contributing throughout every stage of its development. Work is currently underway to have the quilt permanently installed at the York Mills Subway Station, metres away from the site of the accident.

Finally, fair work is family and community-friendly.



REMEMBER THEM WELL

On March 17, 1960, these five men died while digging a water-main tunnel thirty- five feet under Hogg's Hollow in Toronto. Management had been warned repeatedly that the worksite was unsafe, but took no action.

When a flash fire hit, the men were caught without hard hats, flashlights, breathing equipment, or any contact with the surface. They were trapped in choking smoke, blocked by smoldering cables. Their air was cut off.

Much of the tunnel caved in. Water poured in to put out the fire turned into a wave of quicksand and mud. The Coroner reported that virtually all safety regulations had been ignored. With the proper safety training and equipment, these men would have survived.

The members of the Construction Unions of Ontario honour these men. The tragedy of their deaths spurred workers to organize stronger unions and demand important safety regulations and labour laws that protect our lives today.



Reels of Change - film & video

Deep Inside Clint Star Clint Alberta, Canada 1999, 88 minutes, Colour, Video

Director Clint Alberta takes us on a hilarious and bittersweet journey into the hearts and minds of some very ordinary, extraordinary young Canadians. Clint, taking on the role of Clint Star, seeks out his far-flung buddies, young Natives like himself. They talk about sex and life....love and abuse... 500 years of oppression--with humour, grace and courage. Deep inside Clint Star explores issues of identity, sexuality and intimacy, while retaining the creative and playful style of a director who is not afraid of turning the camera on himself. This engaging documentary will draw you out of yourself and deep inside Clint Star.

That's Why I'm Working Maarten Schmidt, Thomas Doebele, USA 1999, 53 minutes, Colour, Video

Many children in the slums of Dacca work in the "hidden child labour" circuit. They serve as domestics, collect recyclables, or work in cottage industries, often earning no more than room and board. Employers prefer children aged 8-12; they are old enough to work seriously but too young to protest miserable conditions. That's Why I'm Working focuses on the Ebrahimpur3, a school at the edge of a slum in Dacca, Bangladesh. The film also follows the children from their 3-hour school day to their homes and to work, where they behave almost like adults, fully aware of the importance of their contribution to the family income. Speaking in their own words, the children relate their world views, sharing their worries but also their dreams for the future.

Strong Jamaicans, Stirring Times Video for Change, Jamaica 2000, 120 minutes, Colour, Video

Few of us know the long and stirring history of working class and political struggle by Jamaican workers and their unions. Strong Jamaicans, Stirring Times tells this story, using drama, humour, music - from traditional through jazz to reggae and rap. It combines unseen historical film footage and creative re-enactments of major issues in Jamaican labour history. "Video for Change" and the Jamaican Confederation of Trade Unions collaborated to produce the video.

Big Brother of Christmas Island Matthew Kelly, Australia 1999, 55 minutes, Colour, Video

The fascinating story of Gordon Bennett, an English union leader, and his attempts to dismantle the archaic and racist British Phosphate Commission's form of apartheid imposed on Asian mining workers. By the time he died in 1991, Bennett was nicknamed "Tai Ko Seng", or "big brother who delivers." The film traces the Australian government's attempts to crush the tiny union and shut down the mine.

Showdown In Seattle: Five Days That Shook The WTO Big Noise Production, USA 1999, 120 minutes, Colour, Video

Showdown in Seattle features an on-the-ground, non-corporate perspective and analysis. It examines the late 1999 5-day showdown and the WTO impact on labour, human rights, women and development, agriculture and the environment while remaining as fluid as the daily protests. The production is lively and colourful, full of footage from the streets and meaningful interviews with protest participants. Acclaimed thinkers, such as Michael Parenti, Vandana Shiva and Lech Walesa provide engaging critiques of the WTO, corporate globalization and the corporate-owned media. Working Like Crazy Laura Sky, Canada 1999, 54 minutes, Colour, Video


Most psychiatric survivors who've been through the mental health system face poverty, housing challenges and unemployment. But the six who are profiled here have survived by creating their own jobs, training and support systems. These productive people are part of a unique community overseen by the Ontario Council of Alternative Businesses.

How To East A Cast: The Cartoonist Mike Constable, Michael Connolly, Canada 2000, 39 minutes, Colour, Video

Mike Constable is a rough-hewn, acerbic character who has survived a hand-to-mouth existence as a political artist with leftwing ideals. Now his cartoons are in demand by the mainstream press and corporate clients and he is becoming more patronized than ever. Will success spoil this one-time Communist Party member? Out of a cluttered, run-down studio apartment in an alley in Toronto, Constable draws cartoons for both labour and mainstream publications, plans Labour Day Parade skits and makes cartoon animations on the computer he bought with a court settlement against his landlord. With his bushy grey beard and his politics of opposition, like a jolly contemporary version of Karl Marx, he argues provocatively with his anti-communist business agent. While Constable makes his main living doing cartoons for corporate clients and for such magazines as Saturday Night, he still manages to hang on to his view that capitalism's injustices must be exposed.

Reels of Change - film & video

Made in Thailand Eve-Laure Moros and Linzy Emery, USA 1999, 33 minutes, Colour, Video

In Thailand women make up 90 per. cent of the labour force responsible for garments and toys for export by multinational corporations. This powerful revealing documentary about women factory workers and their struggle to organize unions exposes the human cost behind the production of everyday items that reach our shores. Probing the profound impact of the global marketplace on the populations that provide the global economy with cheap labour, Made in Thailand also profiles women newly empowered by their campaign for human and worker's rights. Several of these women are survivors of the 1993 Kader Toy Factory fire, one of the worst industrial fires in history. Today they are highly effective leaders in the grass-roots movement mobilizing workers in their recently industrialized country.

Christopher Eccleston narrates the compelling story of how a small group of sacked Liverpool Dockers wrote their own two hour television drama: DOCKERS. With the help of screenwriter Jimmy McGovern (The Lakes, Cracker, Hillsborough) and novelist Irvine Welsh (Trainspotting, The Acid House), the Dockers sat down once a week for over a year to write a script based on the human drama of their two and a half year dockworkers dispute. Their collective voice became a Channel 4 film drama. This documentary follows that unique experiment as Jimmy McGovern guides the budding screenwriters through the rights and wrongs of his craft and the Dockers tell him how it was - in their own words.

Hammering It Out! Vivian Price, USA 2000, 54 minutes, Colour, Video






