

A Note on Mayworks

Mayworks Festival of Working People and the Arts is a multi-disciplinary arts festival that celebrates working-class culture. Founded in 1986 by the Labour Arts Media Committee of the Toronto and York Region Labour Council, Mayworks is Canada's largest and oldest multi-disciplinary labour arts festival. Mayworks' goal is to develop an audience for the arts among working people and to create a forum to present working-class culture to non-union audiences.

The Mayworks Festival was built on the premise that workers and artists share a common struggle for decent wages, healthy working conditions and a living culture. Mayworks' goal is to promote the interests of cultural workers and trade unionists and to bring working-class culture from the margins of cultural activity onto centre stage.



Polluted Acts

Polluted Acts is a multimedia, performative forum on the politics of interventionist community art and access to public space. The forum highlights the summer 2000 community art project. The Garbage Collection which produced large scale murals that were painted onto the sides of the city's garbage trucks. The project addressed many issues, including: garbage, urban landfills, the commodification of art and access to public space. Within 48 hours of public exposure, one of the murals: The Water Truck. was pulled from its route and censored by the city. The censored mural depicted the city run over by garbage that had to be exported to rural outposts. Combining videos of the murals, their production and the subsequent media spin of their censorship with presentations from multiple perspectives, the forum offers a space for public discussion of the many dimensions of this issue.
