May Day! May Day! Art to Action to Art to Action to Art to Action...

The artwork on the cover of this program guide offers the possibility for multiple and layered interpretations. Karen Bell, visual artist, chose to work in broad strokes and wild colour that might be experienced as whimsical. In contrast, the central image of a woman working at a computer, wearing what appears to be a gas-mask or face guard, is disturbing; conjuring representations of the future from popular culture – of mechanized people disconnected from the body and its limitations. She is flanked by two clocks; her day at work without apparent end or beginning. The number 1886 introduces another layer, a window into the past.

In Chicago on May 1st, 1886 workers went on strike for an eight-hour work day. The striking workers were regarded as 'radical anarchist rioters'. In many history texts, that day is commonly referred to as 'The Haymarket Riot' where, in 1889, a 9-foot bronze of a Chicago police officer was erected on the original 'riot' site. Today, May 1st 1886 is widely recognized as the beginning of the labour movement as we now know it.

117 years later, and the movement for workers' rights is more relevant than ever. This 18th Mayworks Festival celebrates May Day as the International Day of Workers. As well, in shouting out May Day twice, we are sending out an SOS – a call to action – a call for art to action – to all activists and unionists to respond to the deterioration of our public infrastructures both locally and on a global political level.

Welcome to the 18th annual Mayworks Festival of Working People and Arts where you'll be engaged, inspired, challenged, and moved. Here, unionists, workers and artists stand together for a living, thriving culture.

Is the Crown at War with Us?

Is the Crown at War with Us? is a new feature documentary by Alanis Obomsawin that draws attention to the conflict over fishing rights between the Mi'amag people of Esgenoopetiti (Burnt Church), New Brunswick, and their non-Native neighbours. The Mi'gmag have been fishing the waters of Miramichi Bay since time immemorial, and their right to do so had been upheld in a landmark 1999 Supreme Court decision. But when the people of Esgenoopetitj tried to exercise their long-standing treaty rights, they found themselves under attack by non-Native commercial fisherman, and harassed by officials from the Department of Fisheries and Oceans. This video documents a disturbing and profound picture of a community under intense pressure. Alanis Obomsawin's earlier film Kanehsatake: 270 Years of Resistance won the top prize for Canadian film at the 1993 Toronto International Film Festival. Based on conversations with members of the Disobbedienti movement, this film explores the origins, political basis, and forms of direct action. The Disobbedienti emerged from the Tute Bianche during G8 summit in Genoa in July 2001. Tute Bianche, the name




of the white-clad Italian activists who, in direct actions, used their bodies as tools of civil disobedience. The Tute Bianche removed their trademark white overalls, that had given them their name, and blended amongst the 300,000 other demonstrators at the G8 smmit. The transition from the Tute Bianche to the Disobbedienti, the disobedients, marks a shift from "civil disobedience" to "social disobedience."


Breaking Ground, The Hogg's Hollow Disaster, 1960 and Canadian Young Workers Memorial Quilt

Laurie Swim

Two monumental community-built art quilts created by artist and activist Laurie Swim will be presented publicly in Toronto this spring. In 2000, in partnership with COSTI Immigrant Services and as a Millennium Project with the City of Toronto, Laurie Swim initiated Breaking Ground, The Hogg's Hollow Memorial, 1960, a 7' x 20' fabric art memorial, in remembrance of five young Italian immigrant workers killed while digging the tunnel in 1960. This event instigated monumental changes in safety regulations in Ontario. In spring 2003, Breaking Ground will be installed at the York Mills and Yonge subway station, a site very near the site of the accident. The Canadian Young Workers Memorial Quilt is a memorial to 100 young workers who died in the workplace. By bringing together the stories of the victims in one place. Laurie hopes to effect a change in workplaces to protect Canadian Youth. Featured in the 9' x 18' textile hanging, created with the participation of volunteer stitchers from across Canada, is a 9' x 6' centrepiece, showing a youth with uplifted arms showered by a rain of gold and surrounded by columns of commemoratives for 100 young victims. 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

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




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
