This year Mayworks reflects on the continuing relevance of health and safety issues in our working lives and communities. From the construction site to the factory floor to the administrative desk to the fast-food outlet to our neighbourhoods, issues of safety are as paramount as ever. The recent stats are staggering: 239 registered workplace deaths in Ontario, with another 346,639 illness/injury claims registered. And these are the ones we know about!

What about the statistics we don't hear about? Violence against women in the workplace for example, or human rights abuses of trade unionists around the globe, or what about health issues of poor people and low-income earners, and unorganized workers? According to the constitution of the World Health Organization, "health is a state of complete physical, mental and social well-being and not merely the absence of disease or infirmity."

We have attempted to highlight specific issues of health and safety that affect particular communities of workers and their lives, and as a result our larger communities. Asserting that we are not only after safe jobs for all, but that we expect an integrated approach when it comes to living healthy and safe lives, the 2004 festival is challenging, innovative, fun and inspiring.

Pretty Porky and Pissed Off (PPPO) artists Gillian Bell, Joanne Huffa, Allyson Mitchell, Abi Slone, Mariko Tamaki, Tracy Tidgwell, and Zoe Whittall use visual art, dance, film, music and literature as a means of exposing and challenging negative stereotypes that affect fat women.

For Mayworks Festival, PPPO created a multimedia performance, *Big Judy*, which focuses on how fat women negotiate their bodies as they move through public and private spaces, and issues of employment equity, fat phobia, accessibility, health care, cafeteria politics, and the mysteries of control top pantyhose. *Big Judy* was presented at George Brown College as part of the college's School of Labour *Labour Fair* at St James and Casa Loma Campuses in March, and one festival public performance at the *Girl Friday Crashes Glass* program on Friday May 7.

Afua Cooper, one of Canada's most versatile poets of Afro-Caribbean origin, incorporates African riddims and the musical vibes of the Black diaspora in her poetry. She has published four books of poems including *Memories Have Tongue*, one of the finalists in the 1992 Casa de las Americas literary award. Her scholarly endeavours have made a vast contribution to gender studies in African North American history.

Afua Cooper, in collaboration with percussionist **Nation**, and dancer/choreographer **Afua Marcus**, performed *Servile Labour*, a new work that focused on the role of African Canadians in Canada's workforce, for over 400 students at Sir Oliver Mowat High Collegiate Institute in September 2003, and at Central Technical High School in October 2003.



Turtle Gals Performance Ensemble was founded in 1999 with a commitment to bringing Native women's stories to the stage. Veteran theatre artists, **Jani Lauzon**, **Monique Mojica** and **Michelle St. John** have won over audiences and critics with their first original play, *The Scrubbing Project*, which was co-produced by Turtle Gals, with Native Earth Performing Arts and in association with The Factory Theatre.

"Several years ago, we gathered to talk about race, colour and sexuality. We told stories and talked about what could lie beyond the popular culture's imagery of Native women, i.e. Disney's *Pocahontas*. Out of the conversation emerged a recurring theme: scrubbing. Either we, or someone we knew had at some point tried to scrub off or bleach out their colour. This realization, whet our appetite to explore the manifestations of the internalized racism we carry."

For Mayworks in the Schools Program, Turtle Gals will do two performances in May in high schools across Toronto both about the role of work in Native people's lives from pre-colonization to the present and the role of Native workers in Canada.

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
he performance program challenges us to think about systemic structures that impede the health of our communities. We live in a climate that does not support activism, or resistance art. Since the dawning of 'the war on terrorism', (which is nothing new in our imperialist culture) health, safety, and security have become code words for "us and them". A divided world does not breed well-being for anyone.

We need artists' vision, the solidarity of labour activists, the guidance of Indigenous peoples, and the courage of women. We need a culture where we all have the opportunity to do well, and be well. Mayworks brings this vision through diverse artists, art practices, and programming; *Queer Verve* tackles creating healthy communities; *Bad Girls Run Amok* focuses on changes in labour and morality laws as related to burlesque artists' work; *Girl Friday Crashes Glass* blows the ceiling off of gender stereotyping; the *CUPE Cabaret* celebrates *Cinco de Mayo; Stories from North/West* inspires fits of laughter; *The Great May Day Cabaret* opens the Festival with an antidote to Monday blues; *Celebrating VOICES & VISUALS* foregrounds the imaginations of part-time undergraduate students; and *The Labour Left: Fighting for Change, Yesterday and Today* examines the lessons of labour's left.

And we are honoured to be joined by Yukon artists Ivan E. Coyote, Kim Beggs, and Anne Louise Genest, and Alberta artists Maria Dunn and Shannon Johnson.

I anticipate every performance; I hope that you will join us as often as you can these nine days.




Bad Girls Run Amok

Sunday May 9 . 9 pm . 15 - 20 sliding scale The Gladstone Hotel, 1214 Queen Street West east of Dufferin Street

The Toronto Burlesque and Vaudeville Alliance (TBVA) with Mayworks Festival is pleased to present Bad Girls Run Amok, Toronto's first large-scale, collaborative burlesque show featuring all local artists at the Gladstone Hotel — Toronto's turn-of-the century burlesque house! The performance follows a timeline from the Bad Girls of Burlesque's heyday of the 1930s to the early 1960s, to the modern revival of this previously lost art form. In over 25 performance pieces, Bad Girls Run Amok celebrates the history of women's sexuality and power. This burlesque showcase tells a colourful story, closely linked to changes in both labour and morality laws. Since the Victory Theatre in Toronto closed in the late 1970s, this old style of entertainment was largely "dead" in this city. Twenty years later, in the late 1990s, Toronto's burlesque revival began, pioneered by Sasha van BonBon and Tanya Cheex and their respective troupes, The Scandelles and Skin Tight Outta Sight. The two troupes co-founded the TBVA in July 2003, to provide opportunities for new and established performers to make connections, trade performance tips, book acts, and generally create a sense of community amongst artists and fans. For Bad Girls Run Amok. The Scandelles and Skin Tight Outta Sight are joined by a new troupe of racy bad girls, The Harlettes, Kristine 'The Ripple' Inez, Mysterion the Mind Reader, the Brothers Rhinestein and more!

Our film and video program that includes *Speak Out!* and *Activist Video on the Fly!* stirs up screenings and panel discussions with videomakers, activists, and unionists. This is where the talking, challenging, questioning, networking and learning are bound to happen.

The Gladstone Hotel, built over a century ago, stands at the perimeter of Parkdale. The hotel is a grim shadow of its original elegance and today it is being restored. The regular clientele that have warmed the bar stools and worn its bed-sheets come from a workingclass community; comprised mainly of men, who are drifters, bar-flys and forgotten rebels. Lost & Found at The Gladstone Hotel layers the architectural rehabilitation of the hotel against the excavation of the lives of patrons and staff who inhabit the rooms and hallways and drink at the hotel bar. Pamela Gawn is a photographer, filmmaker, youth worker, and CUPE Local 2189 activist. Lost & Found is also part of CONTACT 2004 Toronto Photography Festival.

Bookends

Bookends is an installation and visual art exhibit showcased in two bookstore windows, Toronto Women's Bookstore and Pages Books and Magazines **curated by Hon-Yee Choi**

Work is a form of action. It involves movement, labour, and time. It taxes dollars. It taxes bodies. The growing policing of all sorts of borders – international, migrant, class, neighbourhood, and street borders to name a few – are reminders of the links between work and access.
