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

Quebec artists Julie Faubert and Héloïse Audy interviewed thousands of seamstresses working in Montreal's textile industry to create this textile and sound based installation. Asking them to write down what they thought about at work in their own languages, the artists created an immense dress, formed by thousands of pieces of scrap fabric gathered from textile factories that were cut, died and assembled. The seamstresses' thoughts have been sewn one after the other inside the dress making visible this part of their everyday ordeal which usually remains unseen and unheard. The work includes a sound component: voices of many women, from diverse origins, hidden inside gallery walls. This poignant and powerful work gives the viewer an inside glimpse at the women behind the mass-produced 'standard' garment.
