





Seven spoken word artists reflecting the diversity of Toronto and hailing from several parts of the globe will go toe-to-toe on the theme of labour demonstrating their talent for lyricism and their mastery of the spoken word. Dianah Smith will be sharing stories about family separation, immigration and the complicating factors of racism, isolation and the struggle for self-love. janet romeroleiva's writings explore immigrant displacement/denied aboriginality/loving in dos lenguas. Leah Lakshmi Piepzna-Samarasinha writes about being the full scholarship daughter of a two-job working, white, mill town mom and a middle class Sri Lankan dad who lost some of his privilege in the diaspora, but not the crispness of his accent. It portrays the crazy-making experience of people facing long-term disability and endless disbelief. Based on real-life stories and cutting edge research, *Easy Money* returns to Mayworks in a full production with professional actors, video, puppets and music by **Rick Sacks**.

Artists Rafeef Ziadah, Marika Schwandt and Christine Luza collaboratively created, produced and will perform this original play.


#### Trans Cab:

Directed by **Alec Butler** with dramaturge **Wolfgang Vachon**, *Trans Cab* explores the experiences of two trans characters Terri, a male-to-female transsexual and Robert, a female-to-male transsexual and their experiences in a fictional Toronto shelter. *Trans Cab* blends traditional elements of cabaret style music and audience participation, lipsynch performances and lots of humor to explore some very serious issues. 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
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


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

#### From a Whisper to a Roar: Portraits of Resistance Sunday April 29 – Tuesday May 7 Lot 16, 1136 Queen Street West Opening Reception: Sunday April 29, 7 pm, Free

This multi-disciplinary event From a Whisper to a Roar centres on the struggles of working people against war and for justice, for a world in which we live and work together in peace. Featuring hip-hop artist Mohammed Ali Aumeer and contemporary dance troupe Victoria Mata Dance Collective. Shot with a pinhole camera by Kathryn Palmateer are the rough and gritty portraits and words of U.S. war resisters. Alongside these portraits will be jenna dawn mclellan's mixed media art, These Are Not Toys, and screening Career Opportunity, a short film written by Shawn Whitney and directed by Kathryn Palmateer about the courage to resist the pull of the army.

Youth-at-Work is a photography exhibit by young artists between the ages of 12–17 who live in the Lawrence Heights community. The exhibit will consist of photographs of young people at work – youth who work at the Community Centre, at the Library, at the mall, and various other workplaces in their community. Where do young people work and what kind of working conditions do they endure? Youth-at-Work gives young people the tools to represent and voice these experiences.

This visual arts show is both a documentation and confrontation of the lives and experiences of Palestinians living under Occupation. The quality of life of Palestinians is nothing short of sub-standard, living in enclosed spaces without freedom of movement and up to 75% unemployment is only the beginning. Firmly rooted in a belief that art is an important tool to influence social movements and political action, curators Nahed Mansour and Simone Schmidt aim to expose the injustice of Israeli Occupation and challenge us to check all the media stereotypes at the door, in order to genuinely consider the voices of these artists in relating their experiences. Among others, the work of Palestinian visual artists including Nidal El-Khairy and photographer Muthana Al-Qadi will be featured.

Art for Change is a retrospective of works from the mid 70's to the present day by British artist **Loraine Leeson**. Women workers—particularly low-income earners—are largely invisible, unrecognized and undervalued. What assumptions do we have about the work lives and ambitions of women who are homeless, under-housed, facing poverty and who are users of local support services? How are life struggles and job struggles interrelated? This mixed media exhibit is the culmination of a series of art-making activities over the preceding months with diverse women participating from several community-based organizations/centres, led by artist/curator **Elaine Munro**.

Off Focus is an interactive installation/performance by Lina Rodriguez and Rita Kamacho. Through Filipino food, video, performance and a round table discussion, Off Focus seeks to give visibility to Filipino foreign domestic workers and raise awareness and questions about the labor conditions under the Live-In Caregiver Program (LCP) in Canada. What does it mean for live-in caregivers to be in a country where they just have the right to work in a specific job, with a specific employer under his/her roof? Why can't they have full rights as workers in Canada? These and other questions are explored in Off Focus.

#### Bookends: Minding Matters of Work Thursday April 26 – Wednesday May 9, Free

Bookends is a visual arts installation showcased in two bookstore windows, Toronto Women's Bookstore and Another Story Bookshop. Minding Matters of Work is purposely packed with multiple meanings. Work can be all consuming: whether we are over-employed, overworked, under-worked, underpaid, working without protection. What matters about work? Matters of work will always impact a person's overall health, including mental health.

Hands-Off Sau Wai Tai Toronto Women's Bookstore Window, 73 Harbord Street

There are many misconceptions that immigrants who have been here for some time are doing well, but studies and anecdotal stories show otherwise. This is especially true for women of colour, who are faced with long-term underemployment and precarious working conditions, an experience that evokes a feeling of being left behind, having our hands cut-off. Hands Off, a pair of cast hands, is a visual representation of these unacceptable social conditions by artist Sau Wai Tai.

Teeter Totter Sandra Brewster Another Story Bookshop Window, 315 Roncesvalles Avenue

Concerns around health and quality of life have always been a part of **Sandra Brewster**'s consciousness when accepting paid opportunities. As an artist looking to gain experience in teaching or other arts-related positions as a means for income, Brewster is offered contract work that doesn't necessarily – or ever – include safe working conditions, a health plan or financial security in the event of an on-the-job accident. This makes working and accepting work very risky. Content to do the work, to expand her mind, to grow and learn from various artistic experiences teeters and totters with these safety concerns.

#### Sir! No Sir!

An important and largely forgotten element of the war in Vietnam – the GI Movement – resulted in many active duty servicemen and women being tried and convicted of mutiny among other offenses, simply for opposing a war now widely accepted to have been both unjust as well as extremely poorly planned and executed. *Sir! No Sir!* directed by **David Zieger**, reveals the stories of the military men and women who helped force the U.S. government to end the Vietnam War.

Let Them Stay features exclusive one-on-one interviews with U.S. war resisters in Canada, documenting their life-changing experiences in Iraq and the hidden realities of U.S. military recruitment and warfare. Following the video screening, a member of the War Resisters Support Campaign will speak about the War Resisters movement.

Granito de Arena is the story of hundreds of thousands of public schoolteachers whose grassroots, non-violent movement took Mexico by surprise, and who have endured brutal repression in their 25 year struggle for social and economic justice in Mexico's public schools.

Award-winning Seattle filmmaker, Jill Freidberg (This is What Democracy Looks Like, 2000), spent two years documenting the efforts of over 100,000 teachers, parents and students fighting to defend the country's public education system from the devastating impacts of economic globalization. Granito de Arena places the Mexican teachers' struggle in a global context, clearly spelling out the relationship between economic globalization and the worldwide public education crisis. This documentary fuels indignation, inspires action, and raises important questions about democracy, sovereignty and the universal right to public education.
