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

Mayworks is pleased to see the return of the popular Mayworks in the Schools program, which brings artists into Toronto schools in cooperation with the Equity Department of the Toronto District School Board and school-based members of OSSTF.


This year's multi-faceted program starts with two highly acclaimed emerging poets, **Boonaa Mohammed** and **Truth Is**. Together, in the lead up to the festival they will go into three Jane and Finch high schools to conduct poetry and spoken word performance workshops with students, in order to give voice to their experiences as young workers in Toronto's contemporary labour force. The second part of this year's program is a partnership with our counterparts, Mayweek in Edmonton and Mayworks in Winnipeg, that will send poets from each region to perform at each festival with newly minted poems commissioned by each city. Look for the culmination of the Schools program at this year's festival where students will join a vibrant performance space of Canada-wide poets at the *Workhorse: Spoken Word Showcase* (see listing under Performance/Cabarets section).

Truth Is... is an avid guerrilla poet taking poetry from street to street. She has been featured at many reading series, schools and conferences and also just finished participating in the 8th annual *When Sisters Speak* spoken word concert held in Toronto. Her passion is only surpassed by her desire to explore and express the truth itself, and this becomes obvious when her poetry is spoken.

Boonaa Mohammed has won numerous poetry slams around Toronto and was recently crowned the 2007 CBC Poetry Face-Off's 'Best New Artist'. He has also been featured in the historical *When Brothers Speak* spoken word concert and was a member of Team Toronto in the Canadian Festival of Spoken Word annual team poetry slam. Currently touring high schools around the city, Boonaa continues to use his poetry to help educate and entertain audiences of all ages.



A keystone of festival programming is cultural presentations at work sites, picket lines and union meetings across Toronto. On April 28 **The Delightful Divas** will perform at the Steelworkers Toronto Area Council and then join the Toronto & York Region Labour Council's annual Day of Mourning, a ceremony to remember workers who have been killed or injured on the job and in the workplace over the last year. *The Delightful Divas* are a harmonious trio of *a cappella* singers featuring vocalists **Shelley Hamilton**, **Phyllis Hamilton**, and **Tricia Williams**. 
Working It Out: Trans People Are Workers Too! Saturday April 26, 7 pm, \$8-\$12 s/s Buddies in Bad Times Theatre, 12 Alexander Street Curated by the Works on Work Collective

Working it Out is a cabaret-style, art-based forum exploring a multiplicity of experiences of being Trans in the workplace. Notions of being stealth (i.e. not being out as Trans) on the job, working in 2-gender(ed) workspaces, the creation of Trans inclusion policies, the complexities of transition in relation to uniform and dress codes and more collide in this collection of works on work and working in a transgressive body. Working it Out looks at many different types of work available for someone who is out and Trans, tackles issues like transitioning on the job, coming out at work as Trans, and the many feelings and important community building that comes out of sharing these experiences. The line-up includes singer-songwriter/comedian Renee Odo; director, dramaturge and writer, Tristan Whistan; experimental, multi-media poet and performance artist, Ryli Skelton and others. Visual artists Daryl James Bucar, Chris Ablett and Dagny Thompson will set the stage for the performances through their visual installations in the space. Also featuring the Blinking Cursor anthology of writing by Trans workers - new written works all created while working! Working it Out will provide a valuable forum for Trans artists. writers, activists, educators and their friends and allies to come together and collaborate on a multi-media interpretation of how we experience ourselves and our bodies and how we, each day, work it out!

Boonaa Mohammed has won numerous poetry slams around Toronto and was crowned the 2007 CBC Poetry Face-Off's 'Best New Artist'. He has also been featured in the historical When Brothers Speak spoken word concert. Pip Skid's brutally honest, blue-collar anthems have been embraced by the thousands of listeners who feel just like him, but have never had a voice to represent them until now. Pip Skid, hailing from Winnipeg, is the voice of the angry, the broke, the tired and the fed up - whether he likes it or not. lan Nana Yaw Adu Budu Keteku, a.k.a Emcee E, is a man of many names and coincidentally many ambitions: musician, freestyler, grad student and possible future Prime Minster of Canada! You can find him at local studios in the Alberta area throwing down insightful lyrics, or attending and damaging egos at the biggest battles of the year. Winner of the 2007 Mayworks Poetry Face-Off, third generation Palestinian refugee and spoken word artist/activist, Rafeef Ziadah returns for a not to be missed encore performance. Rafeef uses spoken word to bring out the silenced Palestinian narrative of Nakba, exile and return. They will be joined by students from local Toronto high schools who are participants in the Mayworks in the Schools Program. Performing original poems, come out to hear these dynamic poets for what promises to be some of the most enthralling performances of the festival!

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


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

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

What Works is a photography exhibit representing issues of immigration, family and work. Youth artists from Speak Out for Youth Action (S.O.Y.A) showcase photography created during a six-week workshop facilitated by editorial photographer Alex Felipe. SOYA is a group of 14 to 21 year old Asian youth primarily living in the Riverdale-Regent Park area. The majority of the members are low-income, recent newcomers from mainland China.

Young working people in general, and young newcomers in particular, face specific struggles for decent wages and healthy working conditions. These struggles are usually waged outside the traditional organizing domains of trade unions. How can the labour movement catch up to the realities of a new generation of low-wage immigrant workers? What global conditions are pushing and pulling this new source of labour from overseas?

As a co-exhibition, *A Quilt of Our Own* is a participatory art project facilitated by the **Chinese Canadian National Council – Toronto Chapter**. During various events in 2008 with the Chinese Canadian community, people were invited to submit a quilt square depicting their experiences living and working in Canada. The larger project by CCNCTO will partner with Chinese garment homeworkers and community supporters to sew together the quilt squares to represent the memories and experiences of a diverse Chinese community working, settling, struggling and adapting to life in Canada. This hands-on exhibit as part of Mayworks will give visitors an opportunity to contribute their own quilt square.

Desire, Defy, Demand, Dream Drawings and video installation by Lynn Hutchinson and Sau Wai Tai Wednesday April 30 – Friday May 30 Toronto Free Gallery, 1277 Bloor Street West Opening Reception: Wednesday April 30, 6 – 9 pm, Free

metanoia is a series of new drawings by artist Lynn Hutchinson. Expanding on the phenomenon of madness from individual to state, and the resulting impulsion to crisis and redemption, metanoia is an exploration of outrages: rivers of fabric sewn by children, intensive surveillance, poisoned roses that fly from the hands of workers in Colombia to the vases of Toronto, inverted landscapes, women working in walled compounds with shreds of sky above them, floods that tear at highways and bury hog feedlots, immigrant women who clean Canadians' kitchens and raise their children. Digital clocks silently mark the passage of this madness.

On the other side are coalescing fragments of defiance. *metanoia* is a series of drawings that charts the insinuation of social madness - the obscenity of corporate globalization and exploitation - into our lives and bodies, and our response: gestures and strategies of resistance.

the end is also the beginning adheres to themes in the metanoia drawings. In a series of small paintings, it tells the story of a village devastated by maquiladoras, of lives of women workers from that village, and their final vindication in a timeless river.

A visual art/video/installation project, *Hands Off* is a continuation of **Sau Wai Tai**'s installation piece as part of Mayworks' Bookends last year. *Hands Off* looks at situations that many immigrants, particularly women of colour, face as a result of globalized economies including chronic unemployment, income inequities, and deteriorating health. Over 15 immigrant women were invited to participate in workshops to tell their stories about living and working in Canada, through video footage and casting their hands. Placed on the floor, pairs of cast hands belonging to immigrant women capture various expressions about their current state of being.

Bookends This Land: Ancestral Stories Friday April 25 - Friday May 9, Free

Bookends is an annual Mayworks exhibit that displays visual art in the storefront windows of two independent bookstores, Toronto Women's Bookstore and Another Story Bookshop. *This Land: Ancestral Stories* is the curatorial theme of this year's Bookends exhibit. Land is embedded with stories. Whether as a witness of colonization, a provider of food and shelter, or a job site for non-status workers, it never stops reminding people about how it gives, is used, and was taken.

Repetition Theresa Morin Toronto Women's Bookstore Window, 73 Harbord Street

Through the layering and altering of old postcard images and contemporary photographs, *Repetition* tells the story of the land on which **Theresa Morin**'s grandfather's family lived. In 1850, the community was divided by a treaty that moved some members several miles to the north and east. Morin's family was not included in the treaty. In the early 1980's, Morin moved to an apartment across the street from the land, unaware that she was returning to where her ancestors had lived for many generations.

Ancestral Stories Brenda Joy Lem Another Story Bookshop Window, 315 Roncesvalles Avenue

Brenda Joy Lem's maternal grandparents settled in Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan, over 100 years ago. They had seven children there and ran a restaurant and hotel in the original Chinatown. Her paternal grandparents settled in Oshawa, Ontario, also about 100 years ago. They raised six children who also helped to work in the family hand laundry. Despite the hardship of their lives, they managed to inhabit, humanize and create history in these Canadian landscapes. In the prints, their century long history, rarely acknowledged or documented in this country, is marked and celebrated.



Photographs by migrant farm workers from Mexico and Trinidad in the Simcoe area of Norfolk County portray aspects of tobacco, ginseng and strawberry planting and harvesting, as well as accommodations and spare time on the farms. Hoping to offer Canadians a better understanding of a year in their lives, the workers share photographs of their homes in Trinidad and Mexico – scenes of urban and rural places, family and community. Selections of their photographs, together with texts and studio portraits by **Red Tree** artists, tell the stories of the men – sons, husbands, and fathers – who spend most of the year, every year, away from home, in order to provide for their families. *From One Place to Another: Las dos realidades* celebrates migrant workers' cultural contribution, and demonstrates their impact on Canada's economy.

Mayworks is tremendously pleased to present two back-to-back evenings of the award-winning *Raven Tales* animation series. *Raven Tales* concentrates on the wild and funny adventures of Raven, the most powerful, and one might add, trickiest troublemaker of Native American folklore, and his friends Eagle and Frog among the first people and the strange creatures at the beginning of the world. Raven (Dr. Evan Adams of *Smoke Signals* fame), his brother, Eagle (lan Reid), and the mysterious Frog (Carmen Moore) – anchor the show and provide familiar faces and humorous antics in each episode. Along with the principle characters are a cast of humans, their children, and a group of mythological creatures whose foibles and flaws give our heroes plenty to worry about. *Raven Tales* is humorous, engaging, and educational for kids and people of all ages!

Directed by **Chris Kientz** and **Simon James**, the pilot episode *How Raven Stole the Sun*, has been adapted from a popular Haida myth, and also has elements of Salish and Kwakiutl. Other episodes of *Raven Tales* have been adapted from Cree, Cherokee, Lakota, Navajo, Nisgaa, and other Native American stories from across North America.

Raven Tales is the only series of its kind – a series based on Aboriginal folklore featuring an all-aboriginal cast and produced by a majority Aboriginally-owned production company.


The emergence of a working class and a large homeless population coincided with the industrialization of the city in the 1850's. Come and walk with **Gaetan Heroux** in east downtown Toronto, one of the city's oldest neighborhoods and discover why this long time OCAP member has become fascinated by the history of poverty in one of Toronto's poorest neighbourhoods. During the 2 hour 15 minute walk, you'll find out, among other things, about Toronto's poor houses and about the slums of Cabbagetown, about how wealthy institutions became meeting points for the poor and hear the stories of how the unemployed organized during the depression to stop evictions in Cabbagetown. Led by **Tim Groves**, this 2 hour 15 minute walking tour will cover the struggles of those communities, and the battles along the way. Among other topics it will focus on: labour strikes, slum clearance, religious riots, the great fire of 1904, the Underground Railroad, Toronto's poor house and much more. 
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CARD-CHECK IS NO JOKE



For generations, Ontario workers were able to organize by proving that the majority in a workplace wanted a union. The proof was simple – a legal document, properly witnessed, called a union card. If a clear majority signed cards, the Labour Board certified the union to be their collective voice to deal with the employer.


This is called card-check.

Mike Harris took away that right. He imposed a new barrier to workers exercising their right to organize. A mandatory vote takes place in an environment completely dominated by the boss, where fear and intimidation become the norm. The result – a dramatic decrease in certifications, and a steady erosion of union density.

In contrast, we never lost card-check for sectors covered by federal legislation, and it was eventually restored for construction. But now it needs to be given back to **every worker in this province**. There is no reason for the Ontario government to say that a signature on this legal document - a union card -is any less valid than our signature on a mortgage or a marriage certificate.

We know that unions make a difference in people's lives. It's time to demand the rights of workers to organize be fully restored! It's time for card-check in Ontario!
