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


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

In cooperation with members of OSSTF who are employed at the Equity Department of the Toronto District School Board, the Mayworks in the Schools program brings artists together with students.

This year's opening night features a medley of artists and performers who are guaranteed to pick up your spirits in this economic downturn. As independent artists these performers are intimately familiar with making the most out of lean times. Bring your friends, your loved ones, even your ex-boss and enjoy an evening of performances that will make you feel like you're in the black again! Featuring LAL, a collective of musicians representing Uganda, Bangladesh, Barbados, and India including vocalist Rosina Kazi, laptop musician Nicholas "Murr" Murray, and bassist lan de Souza. With a strong belief in the link between art and social change, the group has developed their own unique sound over the last decade, fusing South Asian roots, West Indian fruits, and melancholic vocals with jazz sensibilities, hip hop influences, down tempo grooves, broken soul, and electro. Prepare to be intoxicated! Born in the town of Limbé in Northern Haiti, hip hop artist Vox Sambou has been writing and performing since age 14. The founding member of the international crew Nomadic Massive, he desires to bring to light the injustices taking place worldwide and particularly in Haiti, using Haiti's most widely spoken language, Creole. Critical, powerful, fulfilling: just some of the words audience members have used to describe Climbing PoeTree's performances. With roots in Haiti and Colombia, Alixa and Naima track footprints across the country and globe on a mission to overcome destruction with creativity. With flawless cadence and impeccable lyricism, these soul sisters weave together their voices to tell powerful stories of suffering and injustice, courage and love in a world plaqued with fear. Poet and spoken word performer La Loba (aka mónica rosas) is an educator/agitator/artist whose work aims to challenge and provoke community discussion on gender, the environment and the 'visible minority experience'. A second-generation Colombian-Peruvian, she grew up in Ontario's one and only city of steel, Hamilton. Shameless writes and performs hip hop because music and poetry sustain us and connect us to each other across differences. She aims to socially and politically commentate, exploring everything from anti-racism and gueer identities to sex-positivity and conquering hopelessness. MataDanZe is an independent Toronto based interpretative dance group that will perform their piece, La Raza Cozmica (The Cosmic Race) an anti-racism choreography with live music that interprets the European Conquest of Latin America. This video ballad is a 60-minute musical multimedia piece depicting the experiences of immigrant women who worked in Edmonton's GWG clothing factory over its 93 year history. With songs written by songwriter **Maria Dunn**, audiovisual materials filmed and edited by **Don Bouzek** of Edmonton's Ground Zero Productions and research, interviews and archival materials provided by historian **Catherine C. Cole**, the performance will feature video footage of women who worked at GWG interwoven with songs inspired by their stories. Toronto's **Asian Arts Freedom School** tears it up with radical Asian words of resistance, poetry, music, bollywood burlesque and beauty to feed the soul. This troupe of performers dig deep into their histories, as youth of varying origins, living and working life out in Toronto. Constantly emerging and re-emerging, Freedom Schoolers take up issues head on in a world where immigrants, people of colour, Asians are still a commodity to this country's labour force and economy. Artists include writer/performer **arti mehta**, spoken word artist **Gein Wong**, photographer **elvina rafi** and others. Freedom Schoolers are mixed-race, adoptee, suburban, hood... they just got here or been here since the 1800s. They are Asian from the Philippines to Palestine, North China to Sri Lanka, and Trinidad to Tibet. Freedom School is launching its first anthology at Mayworks! Be sure to pick one up!

zameen shadbad is a series of photographs taken by **Elvina Rafi** on her last visit home to Pakistan. Shot in and around Lahore, Karachi and Hyderabad, these images are a personal meditation on the heartbreak and helplessness of being diasporic and distant from a homeland that is being ripped apart - by neocolonialism, competing nationalisms and corrupt governments, rulers and institutions - and a mourning for the human lives that have been the cost of the struggles for power in the region since its bloodstained conception.


What happens when a deeply rooted utopian spirit is shaken by disillusioning events? How does idealism resurface and survive? *Oy di velt vet vern yinger, Oh the world will grow younger* explores these questions through the story of Toronto's secular Jewish Left, from its origins in 1920's Eastern Europe, through the Communist Party rifts of the1950's, to its celebration and persistence at present-day Camp Naivelt, a secular, socialist Jewish community, still existing in the midst of Brampton's suburban encroachment.

For the first time in Toronto, together with Mayworks, **Jumblies Theatre** presents an adapted multi-media performance of *Oy di velt vet vern yinger* inspired by the historical research of Professor **Ester Reiter** and the memoirs of **Manya Lipshitz**. Featuring a multi-age community cast, an audio sound-track of voices young and old, live music and characters from the Twelfth Children's Jewish Work Commune in 1920's Russia. Through an interactive and participatory performance, you will be both an audience member and participant, and add your own voice and views, and enjoy refreshments and a documentary installation.

The artistic team includes **Ruth Howard**, concept and script creator, designer, artistic director; **Martin van de Ven**, composer, musical director, musician (clarinet); **Lisa Marie DiLiberto**, director; **Sean Frey**, associate designer and director; **Michelle Silagy**, choreographer; **Mitch Willer**, musician, songwriter; **Charles Ketchebaw**, video editor; **Maggie Hutcheson**, researcher, and other artists, production team and community members.



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
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

Bookends is an annual Mayworks exhibit that displays visual art in the storefront windows of two independent bookstores, Another Story Bookshop and Toronto Women's Bookstore. The curatorial theme, Life and Debt, evolves from Jamaica Kincaid's non-fiction book, A Small Place, and the documentary film titled Life and Debt (2001) by Stephanie Black, which focuses on globalization, tourist economies and world financial institutions. This year's Bookends exhibits explore how making ends meet is as much about the politics of financial crisis, as it is about personal lives, struggle and solidarity.

Indebted: Erasure and Non-Being

Using a combination of textiles and altered books, **Kate-Christine Miller** examines the entangling effects of international lending. As reflection and resistance to the International Monetary Fund (IMF), *Indebted: Erasure and Non-Being* subtly questions the foundations of the IMF's Code of Good Practices on Transparency in Monetary and Financial Policies, drawing attention to the idea of 'codes' as a form of inaccessibility. Miller's intricate carving of books and other texts, reveals the hidden truths of globalized economies and injustices.

Capitalism: The Ties That Bind

Part of the struggle is naming the situation, no matter how obvious it seems. **Sue Goldstein**'s *Capitalism: The Ties That Bind* uses three figures to encapsulate some of the primary forces that have arisen in late capitalism: prison, security and war, and free trade zones – these are the binding ties. Goldstein's evocative installation brings both a name and the faces to a system where employment made available for many in this world barely pays enough to exist on, let alone repay debts. The system is designed to keep people *in* debt, and when they are unable to pay, there is a place waiting to contain them and their rage: jail, where they must 'pay their debt to society'.

There has never been a movement for social change without visual communications being central to that movement. Graphics are powerful living reminders of struggles for worldwide peace and justice. The use of various formats, from posters to billboards to websites, allow people to critique daily reality and to actively work to transform it. Led by guest artist Favianna Rodriguez, in this workshop you will learn how to design visually engaging posters for a public education campaign of your choice. We will incorporate graphics from the book *Reproduce & Revolt* to develop exciting and engaging materials that have political content. Participants will each produce a completed design. Wear comfortable clothes you don't mind getting dirty! Spaces are limited, so be sure to sign up early to avoid disappointment. Pride and Solidarity Tuesday April 28, 7-10 pm, \$5-\$10 s/s Buddies in Bad Times Theatre, 12 Alexander Street

Pride and Solidarity is a jam-packed evening that will trace the histories and current of queer political movements in Canada and the United States, and the engagement of workers, artists and unions fighting for social justice.

Opening the evening, *Hannah in Bedlam*, a monologue written and performed by acclaimed Toronto artist **christina starr**. Abandoned by a no-good husband and bereft of her baby daughter, Hannah Snell stomped across gender constraints, donned her brother-in-law's uniform and enlisted in the British navy. The year was 1747. Forty-five years later we find this gender rebel committed to London's notorious Bedlam Hospital where an unhinged mind ricochets between identities and the glories and tragedies of a remarkable life.

Two documentary films by award-winning filmmaker **Nancy Nicol** will be screened, which capture the victories and struggles for same-sex relationship recognition and marriage in Canada and the United States. *Politics of the Heart* (68 min, 2005) is a moving portrait of lesbian and gay families who profoundly re-shaped the cultural, political and legal landscape of Quebec and Canada by fighting for recognition of their relationships and their families. In February 2004, President George W. Bush called for an amendment to the Constitution of the United States to enshrine a heterosexual definition of marriage. *One Summer in New Paltz* (54 min, 2008) is a cautionary tale of a young mayor of a small village who decided to do the unthinkable, set against a backdrop of the Bush administration's policy of endless war and assault on civil liberties.

A question and answer period will close the program, including Nancy Nicol and **Fred Hahn**. Fred was elected Secretary Treasurer of CUPE Ontario in 2006, making him the first openly gay man to be elected to a full-time officer position in CUPE Ontario.



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

Recommended and booked one musical act as part of the proceedings of the women's conference.


