In working on this project, I wanted to honour the history of Mayworks, while looking ahead at labour in a post-COVID19 world. In this poster, two hands in the shape of old trees sprout new growths as birds return for the spring after a long winter. The deep roots firmly place these hands in space much like Mayworks' history in the city. My process in coming to this imagery started with referencing labour posters and social justice imagery and mixing it with the ornamental style of miniature paintings that my style typically references. Working through rough sketches, colour tests and feedback, I came to this final composition. I hope the image captivates viewers to participate in the festival and, more importantly, create!

#### **About the illustrator**

Pardis Pahlavanlu is an artist and illustrator living as a guest between Tkaronto (Toronto) and unceded Coast Salish territories (Vancouver). While her academic studies have revolved around systems of power in contemporary colonial states, her artistic work has centred on the healing that is necessary in these contexts. Using textured and bold imagery with a mixed mediaapproach, she digs into the topics of mental health, exclusion/difference, and diaspora in hopes of finding new ways to imagine and reflect on her surroundings and experiences.

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## **Essential Work, but Disposable Workers?**



Long before the pandemic hit, essential workers and labour organisers were denouncing the inadequate, if not deplorable, working conditions in their sectors, stemming from a lack of funding, resources and planning, as well as social inequalities arising from systemic racism and gender disparities. A year into the COVID-19 public-health crisis, these problems have been worsened by a neoliberal response that prioritises private interests and profit over the health, safety and wellbeing of frontline workers. This panel brings together workers and organisers from the long-term care, education, temporary and migrant labour sectors to discuss the impact the pandemic has had on them.

## Money Moves: 超时工作, A Conversation

Workers are organizing to win better conditions for themselves and their colleagues, but this can only happen if workers feel they have community support. Given the upsurge in anti-Asian racism and the importance of grocery workers in the context of COVID-19, supporting this work is increasingly important. Edward Hon-Sing Wong, the Chair of the Chinese Canadian National Council - Toronto, describes MoneyMoves: 超时工作 as one such show of support; solidarity expressed through a collaborative art performance. Taking up space in grocery stores without permission from the owners, the making of MoneyMoves: 超时工作 was perhaps equally subversive.

## **Organize Amazon!**

The realities are stark: Amazon founder Jeff Bezos added almost \$100 billion to his net worth during the pandemic, while nearly 20,000 employees tested positive for Covid-19.

Amazon's profits are made possible by the labour of poor and racialized warehouse workers, but also by the company's lucrative technology contracts with police and border agencies.

How can we intervene? This conversation brings advocates for Amazon employees into conversation with cultural workers to discuss organising strategies.



## Looking back, looking forward

## Collective organizing in the arts & culture sector

Long before the pandemic, systemic labour issues in the creative sectors were pushing artists and activists to collectively and collaboratively organize. Installers, artists, curators, arts administrators, and other cultural workers face work precarity in the form of underpaid, unpaid, unprotected, and insecure work. This is doubly true for Queer, Trans, Black, Indigenous, racialized and/or low-income workers seeking job security, safety and access. As these very issues are now being compounded by the pandemic, recognizing 'artists-as-workers' and 'workers-as-artists' is as important as ever. From advocacy to community building, this panel brings together cultural workers from Toronto, Vancouver and New York City experienced in collective organizing. The panelists will share challenges brought on by the pandemic, issues relevant to their members, and reflections on the future of labour justice. Learning from each other, panelists will exchange strategies on how to shift the balance of power in the arts.

## unpruned tomato vines: A Conversation



In the summer of 2019, Tea Base transformed what was once a pile of bricks sitting in the Chinatown Centre mall courtyard into the Anti-Displacement Garden; a place that welcomed public use and community gathering. ## **Money Moves** 超时工作 - A Mayworks Premiere

#### CREATED BY ARTIST EN LAI MAH Runtime: 6.22 minutes

A roving performance that considers the toll of wage theft on the body. MoneyMoves: 超时工作 makes visible what is too often unnoticed: the labour of immigrant workers who put food on our tables. Mah collaborated with elderly grocery store workers to create a performance that is inspired by their work. The resulting performance tells the story of one worker in particular, 56-year old Mr. Bao, who is fighting for compensation after being injured on the job. Subverting the repetitive routines of gruelling work, the performance draws on movement and martial arts to resist feelings of immobility in the body. Filmed in grocery stores across the city, the performance calls grocery workers to find the physical and emotional strength required to stand up to their bosses.

## 9to5: The Story of a Movement

The 1970s saw an explosion of women's participation in the workforce. Many were low paid clerical workers who were typically considered the "office wives" of their male supervisors. A group of secretaries in Boston began organizing for better pay, more advancement opportunities and an end to sexual harassment. With their unconventional approach, a movement was started and 9to5 evolved into the largest membership organization of working women in the United States.

Featuring interviews with 9to5 founders as well as with Jane Fonda who starred in the hit movie based on the movement, this documentary film chronicles the previously untold story of the fight that changed the American workplace.



## The Words We Can't Speak

The Words We Can't Speak, a screenplay in progress by writer and filmmaker Lindsay McIntyre, is based on the true happenings of the writer's grandmother in 1936 in what is now Nunavut.

A seasoned Inuk translator, who works for the Hudson Bay Company, bravely amputates a Qallunaat (white) woman's injured leg, but fails to prevent her death. She becomes unwelcome in the community. In search of acceptance and

a better life, she leaves the Arctic for the white man's world on a dangerous 1800-mile journey by dog sled with her young daughter and an over-confident RCMP Constable. Unprepared for their journey, they encounter life-threatening difficulties and a serious clash of cultures.

Professional actors will work on the script with Lindsay, focusing on character and dialogue. Festival audiences are invited to join for the last two hours to hear a read through of the complete work, followed by a Q&A with the writer.

A digital exhibition at Mayworks Festival in partnership with <u>Tea Base</u>

What was once rubble barricaded by fencing in Chinatown Centre has been transformed by <u>Tea Base</u> and <u>Friends of Chinatown Toronto</u> (FOCT) into a community garden. In unpruned tomato vines artists Christie Carrière, Hannia Cheng, and Florence Yee share stories from the <u>Chinatown Anti-Displacement Garden</u> and trace the role of collective action and communal imagining in challenging forced displacement. Both Christie Carriere's digital illustrations detailing the origin story of the garden and the premiere of Hannia Cheng's short film tracing the garden's growth will be available on VR Tea Base; an online community arts space created by Jason Li. ## **"SEEKING"**BY FLORENCE YEE

"SEEKING" is a series of playful advertisements in the physical and digital world that ask what individuals may be seeking from their communities. During a remote mentorship last summer with another emerging artist, Kiona Ligtvoet and I found a common interest in text and its ability to convey desires in a playful manner. Our project consisted of two independent series of posters that we would create and put into the physical world (on phone polls, park billboards, etc.), as well as adapted "real" ads on Kijiji. They would be short and succinct posters that allude to other discussions we've been having about seeking our community, seeking an old tradition, seeking a memory, seeking a feeling, seeking justice, etc. Without a means of response, they are left with their own agency in the matter, as to what should be done about this lack. My poster series is ongoing, evolving to respond to urgent issues, and exist as ephemera, on the margins of public space. As a project made during lockdown, the content is painfully aware of the seeming futility of reaching out and the hardship of maintaining connections. It highlights an impatient yearning at the intersection of loss and desire.

# HISTORY OF THE CHINATOWN ANTI-DISPLACEMENT GARDEN

Tea Base and Friends of Chinatown Toronto (FOCT) have been maintaining the Chinatown Anti Displacement Garden since 2019. What was once a pile of dirt and rubble behind fences became a new garden and stage that welcomed the public to use it as a community gathering place. The building of the garden was part of a Coast 2 Coast Chinatown's international week of action. The purpose was to draw attention to the displacement and lack of affordable housing for residents and small businesses in Chinatowns across North America which are historically immigrant and working class neighbourhoods. We consider this act of taking care of space as one of the small pieces of resistance against local gentrification. The garden has also become a way for us to base build by getting to know all the various members of Chinatown and nourish community agency and power. Through a series of illustrations, Christie shares the story behind the garden, available through a link on VR Tea Base.

# Latinamerica: Embedding Bodies and Localities

In partnership with Sur Gallery


Through a series of installations at Sur Gallery and virtual interviews available on the Mayworks Festival website, Latin@merica: Embedding Bodies and Localities offers the possibility of rethinking how traditional place-based affiliations and notions of cultural identity end up reproduced, reaffirmed, or even transformed in the digital realm. The exhibition aims to highlight how technology has had an impact in the construction of Latin American identity and its networked localities. New forms of negotiation between the local and the global, between the virtual and the real are constantly being elaborated by the presented works, leading to new ways of understanding what it means to be Latinx and/or Latin American in a contemporary digital field.

Alexandra Gelis, Ana Maria Millán, Santiago Tavera and Laura Acosta interrogate some of the key place-based concerns of Latinx identity through their on-and offline cultural practice. Using new media technologies, these artists express alternative viewpoints about the places they represent allowing people to make important connections to their physical and offline locations. This tactical interplay between virtual and real space to construct new formulations of territorial identity and new cartographies of urban/rural space, give voice to oppositional discussions through new media technologies, alternative modes of expression and dissemination.

The artists in *Latin@merica* engage in re-appropriations and re-imaginings of globalizing technologies, providing space for the expression of resistance discourses and towards the recuperation of cultural memory.

In Corredor, Gelis investigates the strategic use of the Paja Canalera or Elephant Grass (Saccharum Sponteneum) which is a tall grass imported from South Asia to Latin America in the early 1950s and can grow up to 3cm per day spreading its long roots several kilometres wide. This thorny, prickly and invasive imported plant was used by the US army to separate the Panama Canal Zone from the rest of the Panamanian population blocking the entrance to controlled areas. Her work invites the viewer to reflect on borders, bodies and locations and the virtual, physical, imagined or contested forces that control them.

#### THE NOVELS OF ELSGÜER (EPISODE 3): LIVE DESPECHO BY SANTIAGO TAVERA & LAURA ACOSTA

(VR) immersive and interactive installation

For the duo artists Santiago Tavera and Laura Acosta, *The Novels of Elsgüer* is a collaborative project composed of 5 multimedia and immersive installations. Laura's fiber-based practice interacts with Santiago's digitally animated explorations. They develop immersive experiences through the interaction of new media components with mapping projections, virtual/augmented reality components and live performance. In *The Novels of Elsgüer (Episode 3): Live Despecho* the duo explores how concepts of dislocation, translation and migration affect bodies who are constantly crossing borders (both physical and virtual ones).


In Elevación, Ana Maria uses role-playing dynamics to develop an animated narrative in which she interprets and digitally re-enacts different characters, settings and viewpoints inspired by the Colombian comic: "Marauetalia, raíces de la Resistencia" (Marauetalia, the Roots of the Resistance) published in 2011. The comic, whose name comes from the rural birthplace of Colombia's FARC guerrillas, describes the beginnings of the guerrilla movement and the ongoing Colombian armed conflict since the early 1960s. This document becomes a script for role-players to develop their own visions not only in relation to the comic perse but to the constant struggle for power and land ownership, to the violence as a tactical state and resistance discourse from the right, centre and left parties whose ambivalent perspectives have defined the recent history of Colombia.
